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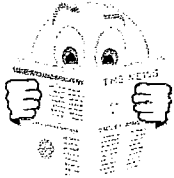

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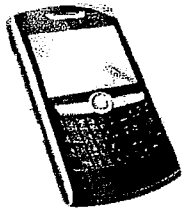


## "GREETINGS"

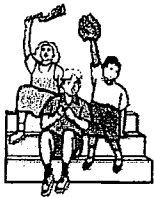
Whereas:

Especially Marty for all the meetings he let me drag him to and my husband John for being my sounding board and rock.

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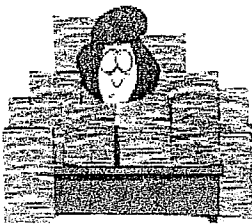
### USE OF THE BALL FIELDS AT BUCHERT PARK

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### A NOTE FROM JENNY

First and foremost, I want to congratulate our own Susan Skrovan for becoming the new Fiscal Officer for Hiram Village. She was an outstanding Assistant Clerk in my office and I will miss her, as will many of you that came here to rent the Park Lodge or pay your water bill. Congratulations Sue!

We have made some drastic changes in Mantua for the sake of remaining financially stable and we will continue to look for opportunities to reduce our expense budget. We are going to streamline some of the work that we do. For

example, from now on, if you would like to rent the Park Lodge or a Pavilion, you will be calling Lisa Davis, Assistant to the Village Administrator, at 330-274-8188.

All of our funds continue to hold steadily in the black. In fact, the Auditor of State's Local Government Services division will be here this spring to take a look at how we are doing things, and we are hoping that we will be removed from Fiscal Watch status. We are also up for a state audit this spring, so it is going to be very busy in my office!



Okay, Income Tax season is also upon us, and I am going to sound like a broken record. I have learned that there are two very common mistakes that I feel I need to mention one more time.

- The first and most common, is that the wage amount you must use from your W-2 is the largest amount, usually in the "Medicare Wages" box.
- The second mistake is that some people are neglecting to attach their W-2 forms. This is needed to verify your wage amount and tax credits to other communities if you work outside of the village.

I would like to remind residents that Income Tax is not a household tax. It is a tax required of anyone that lives in the Village earning an income and is over 18 years old, even if others in the same home are paying. If we miss sending you or your family member an Income Tax Return, please call 330-274-8776 and we will send one out to you. 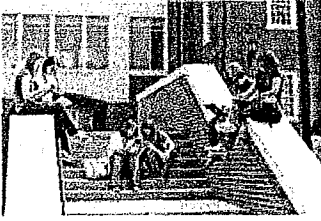

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## FROM CRESTWOOD SCHOOLS

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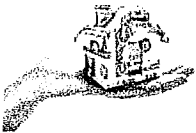

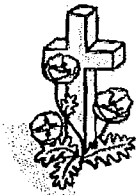
Wrap celery in aluminum foil when putting in the refrigerator and it will keep for weeks.

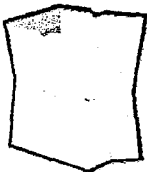

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## NEWS FROM THE SERVICE DEPARTMENT



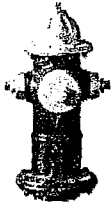

-LEAF BAGS-

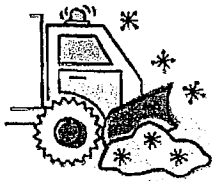
Leaves placed out for pickup must be in bio-degradable paper bags. Because of EPA regulations, the service department will no longer accept leaves placed out for pickup in plastic bags. Leaf bags are still available at the service dept. located at 4880 E high St. Our hours are 8am to 4:30pm. Each household can get 6 free

bags and additional bags will be \$.50 each. Leaf pickup will generally take place on Mondays and Tuesdays unless other projects arise.



- WATER DEPARTMENT-

Due to the diligence of the Mayor and Village Administrators office we have received a grant to replace seventeen fire hydrants in the Village this year. This will not only benefit our residents for safety reasons but also our Fire Department and Water Department. We will keep you updated on other projects we have coming up!!

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### WINTER SAFETY TIPS



Winter isn't a time to just stay indoors and wait for spring. There's a whole wonderland of sports out there for the entire family — sledding, snowboarding, and skiing to mention a few. Plus, someone has to shovel the snow, right?

Once outdoors, however, take precautions to keep your family safe. In ice and snow, accidents can occur easily, and before you know it you might be on your way to the emergency room.

One way to stay healthy while cooped up inside is to make sure your family washes their hands. It's especially important to wash after sharing toys, coughing, and blowing a runny nose to help prevent the spread of viruses.



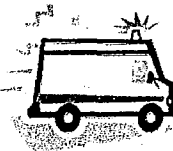
Decided you've had enough of the indoors and you're going to get the family outside to shovel the snow? Fine, but take care. Snow shoveling is strenuous work. It's OK for older, school-age kids to help out, but young children should not be shoveling because they can strain their muscles from lifting heavy shovels full of snow.

Younger or older, kids sometimes have a tough time knowing when to come inside from the cold. To nip frostbite in the bud, check on your kids regularly to make sure that mittens are dry and warm and noses aren't too red.



### Dressing for the Cold

If you're going outside in the cold, stay safe — and warm. Make sure your kids have a snack before going out. The calories will give their bodies energy in the cold weather. And protect your kids' faces with sunscreen. The idea of a sunburn in January can seem odd, but snow can reflect up to 85% of the sun's ultraviolet rays.



### In an Emergency

Kids are at greater risk for frostnip and frostbite than adults, and the best way to prevent it is to make sure they're dressed warmly and don't spend too much time in extreme weather.

Frostnip is an early warning sign of the onset of frostbite. It leaves the skin white and numb. After bringing your child inside, remove all wet clothing because it draws heat from the body. Immerse the chilled body parts in warm (not hot) water — 104-108°F (40-42°C) — until they are able to feel sensation again.

Frostbite occurs mostly on fingers, toes, ears, noses, and cheeks. The area becomes very cold and turns white or yellowish gray. If you notice frostbite, take your child immediately to the nearest hospital emergency room.

Going on a road trip over the holidays? Make sure you have a first-aid kit, extra blankets, and gloves in the car.

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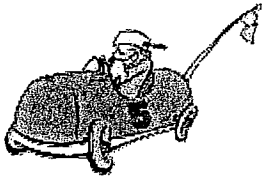

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## NEWS FROM SHALERSVILLE TOWNSHIP

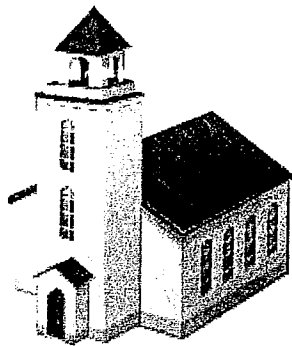

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### CHRIST LUTHERAN CHURCH

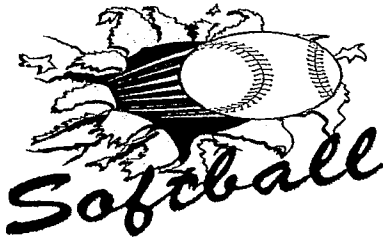

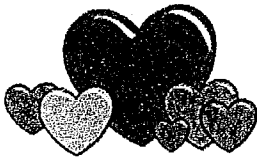

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## The Legend of St. Valentine

The history of Valentine's Day--and the story of its patron saint--is shrouded in mystery. We do know that February has long been celebrated as a month of romance, and that St. Valentine's Day, as we know it today, contains vestiges of both Christian and ancient Roman tradition. But who was Saint Valentine, and how did he become associated with this ancient rite?

According to one legend, an imprisoned Valentine actually sent the first "valentine" greeting himself after he fell in love with a young girl--possibly his jailor's daughter--who visited him during his confinement. Before his death, it is alleged that he wrote her a letter signed "From your Valentine," an expression that is still in use today. Although the truth behind the Valentine legends is murky, the stories all emphasize his appeal as a sympathetic, heroic and--most importantly--romantic figure. By the Middle Ages, perhaps thanks to this reputation, Valentine would become one of the most popular saints in England and France.

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## St. Patrick and the First St. Patrick's Day Parade

\_\_Saint Patrick, who lived during the fifth century, is the patron saint and national apostle of Ireland. Born in Roman Britain, he was kidnapped and brought to Ireland as a slave at the age of 16. He later escaped, but returned to Ireland and was credited with bringing Christianity to its people. In the centuries following Patrick's death (believed to have been on March 17, 461), the mythology surrounding his life became ever more ingrained in the Irish culture: Perhaps the most well known legend is that he explained the Holy Trinity (Father, Son and Holy Spirit) using the three leaves of a native Irish clover, a shamrock.

Since around the ninth or 10th century, people in Ireland have been observing the Roman Catholic feast day of St. Patrick on March 17. Interestingly,

however, the first parade held to honor St. Patrick's Day took place not in Ireland but in the United States. On March 17, 1762, Irish soldiers serving in the English military marched through New York City. Along with their music, the parade helped the soldiers reconnect with their Irish roots, as well as with fellow Irishmen serving in the English army.

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Easter, which celebrates Jesus Christ's resurrection from the dead, is Christianity's most important holiday. It has been called a moveable feast because it doesn't fall on a set date every year, as most holidays do. Instead, Christian churches in the West celebrate Easter on the first Sunday following the full moon after the vernal equinox on March 21. Therefore, Easter is observed anywhere between March 22 and April 25 every year. Orthodox Christians use the Julian calendar to calculate when Easter will occur and typically celebrate the holiday a week or two after the Western churches, which follow the Gregorian calendar.

Easter is really an entire season of the Christian church year, as opposed to a single-day observance. Lent, the 40-day period leading up to Easter Sunday, is a time of reflection and penance and represents the 40 days that Jesus spent alone in the wilderness before starting his ministry, a time in which Christians believe he survived various temptations by the devil. The day before Lent, known as Mardi Gras or Fat Tuesday, is a last hurrah of food and fun before the fasting begins. The week preceding Easter is called Holy Week and includes Maundy Thursday, which commemorates Jesus' last supper with his disciples; Good Friday, which honors the day of his crucifixion; and Holy Saturday, which focuses on the transition between the crucifixion and resurrection. The 50-day period following Easter Sunday is called Eastertide and includes a celebration of Jesus' ascension into heaven.

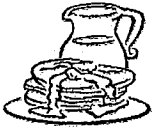
## Lenten Soup Suppers 2013

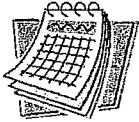
