AUDITOR OF STATE DAVE YOST TODAY RELEASED THE VILLAGE OF MANTUA FROM FISCAL WATCH

"The Village of Mantua dug its way out of financial trouble by making tough choices - not digging into the pockets of its citizens," Auditor Yost said. "This is a proud day for the village."


The Village of Mantua was placed into fiscal watch on August 26, 2008, due to accounts payable exceeding one-twelfth of available revenue and deficit fund balances in five funds.

To eliminate its fiscal watch status, the village took various steps to reduce its total annual expenses by more than \$395,000. The majority of the reductions came through approximately \$252,000 in cuts to the village's general fund. The village also made staff reductions for a total of \$102,000 in annual savings. The village solicitor's annual salary was reduced by \$14,000.

The village increased its annual revenue by \$125,000 without increasing taxes. By providing dispatch services for the Village of Hiram and Mantua-Shalersville Fire District, the village receives an additional \$85,000 annually. The village now sells bulk water and accepts sewage from various companies for an additional \$40,000 annually.

An entity is released from fiscal watch when the Auditor of State determines that the conditions that prompted the declaration are no longer present and will not recur in the entity's three-year forecast.

The Village of Mantua had total revenues of \$719,050 in 2012.



"A GRANT OPPORTUNITY FOR THE VILLAGE"

Dear Residents,

The Village of Mantua is applying to get grant funding to get radio-read water meters for all of our customers. These meters will enable us to change billing from quarter to monthly helping to relieve any economic hardship on residents on fixed incomes or experiencing hard economic times. This new system will enable the us to be alerted to any unusal usage (such as leaks). It will save man hours on reading the meters. We would be able to read all the meters in about 4 hours a month verses 2 men 2 eight hour days a month.

So please assist us when a survey person knocks on your door.

Beginning May 06, 2013 the Portage County Regional Planning Commission will be conducting an income survey of your area of Mantua Village. The information obtained by this survey will help determine whether the Portage County Commissioners can obtain a grant that could help the residents in your area.

Historically, our income rate in the Village of Mantua has been such that it has made it difficult to obtain grants. However, due to the current economic climate we may find

that we are in a better position to obtain grant opportunities dependent upon the outcome of this income survey. Please answer carefully and as accurately as possible keeping in mind that ALL INDIVIDUAL HOUSEHOLD ANSWERS SHALL REMAIN CONFIDENTIAL. It is important to note that the information you provide will be <u>kept by address only and not by name</u> and will be stored at Regional Planning for grant purposes only.

"PARTA"

The Portage Area Regional Transportation Authority - PARTA is in the middle of a major planning study called a Transportation Development Plan. Every transit system in the country conducts similar planning on a 5 to 10 year cycle with the intention of setting a course for the succeeding decade.

The most important component of this planning is obtaining the voices of the community. We will be seeking involvement through a variety of means, but the best opportunities will occur at the 11 community meetings occurring over the next 3 months throughout Portage County.

We have scheduled one meeting at Mantua's Park Lodge for 6:00 p.m. on May 7th. This meeting is specifically directed to the citizens of Mantua and Shalersville Townships and the Village of Mantua. The meetings will be conducted via a structured process whereby attendees will develop a prioritized list of transportation goals in approximately 90 minutes. In order to do this, folks need to be ready to sit down to work at 6:00 p.m.

We strongly encourage the community's participation in this planning process.

Arbor Day Foundation Names Mantua a Tree City USA

Mantua, OH, was named a 2012 Tree City USA by the Arbor Day Foundation in honor of its commitment to effective urban forest management. This is the 18th year Mantua has earned the national designation.

Mantua achieved Tree City USA recognition by meeting the program's four requirements: a tree board or department, a tree-care ordinance, an annual community forestry budget of at least \$2 per capita and an Arbor Day observance and proclamation.

The Tree City USA program is sponsored by the Arbor Day Foundation, in partnership with the U.S. Forest Service and the National Association of State Foresters.

"Everyone benefits when elected officials, volunteers and committed citizens in communities like Mantua make smart investments in urban forests," said John Rosenow, founder and chief executive of the Arbor Day Foundation. "Trees bring shade to our homes and beauty to our neighborhoods, along with numerous economic, social and environmental benefits."

Cleaner air, improved storm water management, energy savings and increased property values and commercial activity are among the benefits enjoyed by Tree City USA communities.

"CRESTWOOD BOARD OF EDUCATION HIRES

NEW SUPERINTENDENT"

The search for a new superintendent ended on April 15, 2013, with the appointment of Mr. David Toth, who will replace retiring superintendent, Joe Iacano on August 1, 2013.

"David has a positive energy and is able to excite people about education and his vision for how he will take our district to the next level," said Bonnie Lovejoy, Crestwood Local Schools Board President.

Forty-seven applicants initially applied for the position and the field was narrowed down to seven candidates for interviews. The final two candidates completed an hours-long interview last week, with the offer extended to Mr. Toth.

"I'm excited about the opportunity," Toth said. "It's an excellent district and I look forward to being part of it." Toth commented that the two previous districts he worked for were similar to Crestwood in size and served multiple communities.

In addition to his Principal position at West Geauga High School, Mr. Toth is an adjunct professor at Ursuline College. He was a 2013 National Blue Ribbon Schools nominee, a principal finalist for the 2010 Intel Schools of Distinction for Science, and in 2005 was the Ohio Administrator of the Year for Drama by the Ohio Education Theater Association.

"FOURTH OF JULY"

Most people know that, but why we celebrate the Declaration of Independence and why its so important they may not know. Here is a closer look at why we celebrate the Declaration of Independence.

Before the Declaration of Independence it wasn't a free country, and colonists felt angry toward Great Britain for always imposing taxes on them and basically telling them how they should live. They no longer wanted to be under British rule and so began starting to make their own government and rules.

The Continental Congress met in Philadelphia, Pennsylvania and appointed a committee of five men to work on a draft of the declaration. The committee is known today as The Committee Of Five. The committee consisted of John Adams, Benjamin Franklin, Thomas Jefferson, Roger Sherman, and Robert R. Livingston. Thomas Jefferson was delegated by the committee to singly write the Declaration although Adams and Benjamin Franklin made many revisions before it was finally submitted to Congress on June 28, 1776.

The Declaration of Independence was adopted on July 4, 1776 and signed by the President of the Continental Congress, John Hancock. So the main reason why we celebrate the Declaration of Independence on the fourth of July is because that was the day it was adopted by the colonies and essentially the day that the United States of America was born. That was the day in history that the United States became a free and independent state from England.

MANTUA POLICE DEPARTMENT YEARLY REPORT - 2012"

The Police Department handled a total of 1054 calls during the last year. A few of these are still under investigation, but most have been cleared.

They have dealt with assaults, thefts, harassment, criminal damage, disorderly conduct, accidents, vandalism, drug-related problems, domestic disputes, menacing, bomb threats and property damage.

There were 73 criminal arrests, 25 accidents, 904 warnings, 411 traffic and parking citations and the cruisers were driven a total of 35,532 miles.

The 25 accidents involved a total of 48 vehicles, 40 vehicles damaged, 6 required towing and there were no injuries and no deaths.

Total phone calls handled by the department dispatchers, for police and fire, including 911 calls, for the Village was 6,102. Total calls for Hiram was 4,196. There were 300 mutual aid calls for other departments, plus 46 meetings, training sessions and seminars attended by various officers.

Officer hours worked was 8,718, Dispatch hours 8,999. There were 256 motorist and public assists, 56 bar checks, and 2,053 house checks. 95 open doors/windows and 165 suspicious persons/vehicles were investigated. Personnel included 12 full and part-time officers and 10 full and part-time dispatchers. Some part-time officers also work as dispatchers.

Other Department activities include: security for parades, races, Ghost Walk, Art On The Hill, Pumpkin Roll, Soap Box Derby, Potato Festival, Triathlon and Trick Or Treat, patrol of the school zones, foot patrols in the downtown area, checking lift stations, reservoir, water and sewer plants, and Safety Town (for bicycle safety).

The Mantua Shalersville Fire Department reported totals of 1,026 EMS calls, 104 motor vehicle accidents, 238 fire calls, and 65 mutual aid calls.

"MEMORIAL DAY - MAY 27TH 2013

The last Monday in May is the day when the United States celebrates Memorial Day. This holiday was originally called Decoration Day, due to the practice of decorating graves of soldiers. It is a day of remembrance for those who have died serving America.

On May 5, 1868, General John Logan, National Commander of the Grand Army of the Republic, officially declared Memorial Day. It was first observed later that month on May 30th when the graves of Union and Confederate soldiers were decorated at Arlington National Cemetery.

President Lyndon Johnson officially declared Waterloo, New York, the birthplace of Memorial Day in May 1966. The reason for this, was that New York was the first state to officially recognize the holiday in 1873. The Southern states that seceded to start the Civil War refused to acknowledge the holiday until after World War I. Because until that point the holiday honored only those who fought and died in the Civil War.

In 1971, Congress put into law that the holiday would be celebrated on the last Monday in May. This was done in order to ensure a three-day holiday weekend. It is important to remember that on Memorial Day, we honor those who died serving our country and protecting our freedoms.

HELMET SMART # 1

Dear Parents:

Children aged 14 and under are very vulnerable to head injury while riding their bikes. This remains true regardless of how responsible and careful your children are when riding their bicycles. Helmets have been shown to reduce the risk of a life-long brain or head injury by 85%. Nationally, AAA reports only 15 percent of all kids wear bike helmets.

Our police department and community are proud to participate in the Helmet Smart campaign. Through this campaign we are encouraging all parents to take an active role in their children's safety by encouraging all children to wear bike helmets when riding. Did you know helmets that meet ASTM shatter-resistant impact standards can be purchased for as little as \$10.00? A helmet can save your child's life!

This year officers from our department and other area police departments will issue a Safety Citation when they witness a bicyclist wearing a safety helmet. This citation can be redeemed for discounted tickets for a free treats from Domino's Pizza. The bearer of the safety citation is also eligible for a drawing for bicycles from AAA and free tickets to Geauga Lake & Wildwater Kingdom throughout the summer.

We also have available for your information on how parents can encourage their children to make it a habit to wear a bicycle helmet every time they ride their bikes. These materials include the "Parent-Child Contract/Tips for Parents" and information on safety helmet use. Should you have any questions on the Helmet Smart campaign, or on bike helmets, please contact our department or AAA at 216-606-6122, or 800-845-0375.

Remember: your child's bicycle is a vehicle, not a toy. Use of helmets can prevent a tragic life-long injury to your children. Only through your active involvement will your children form the helmet habit every time they ride their bicycles. What better way to show your love for your children than to protect them from serious injury by having them wear a helmet every time they ride their bike?

Our first March event was the Showcase of Aurora we gave free rides and took pictures of riders in a race car as we gave them a big PUSH to allow them to try out a race car riding down a school hallway. CEMETERY CLEAN-UP

Christmas and other winter decorations should be removed from Hillside Cemetery by May 8, 2013. All remaining Christmas decorations will be discarded as we begin to clean up the Cemetery for Spring and Memorial Day.



BRUSH PICK-UP

The brush collection program for 2013 will commence in May and continue monthly until and including October. Pick-up will be on the second Monday of the month except Village holidays. If a holiday, then brush pick-up will begin on the next day, Tuesday. Please help us continue this successful program by following the regulations below.

Residents may place brush at the curbside for collection taking care to not block sidewalk areas. Only brush and branches shall be placed with the cut ends at the curb with length not to exceed ten (10) feet and diameter not to exceed three (3) inches. Large diameter branches and trunks will not be taken. Chipping crews will spend a maximum of 20 minutes chipping at each residence.

Piles of brush should be on tree lawn or close to curb with cut side facing the street. This allows the crew to work more efficiently and safe. Avoid stacking brush too high as it may pose a traffic hazard. If brush is too long, it may be placed lengthwise on the tree lawn cut ends facing same direction. Bagged yard waste (i.e. grass clippings, flowers, briars, thorny bushes, and etc.) will not be picked up.

Chipping is intended for brush collection that has been trimmed by homeowners during routine maintenance. The homeowner will be responsible for the disposal of brush/limbs from removal of tree(s), lot clearing; clearing along fence line or property boundaries and it is not to be placed at curb. If a contractor has been hired to perform the work the contractor is responsible for brush/limb removal and it is not to be placed at curb.




