

We have several things happening in the Village. You will note that the Orchard Street paving (CDBG grant) project is complete. Also the Village paved Elm Street from High to Prospect and in doing this project early; Ronyak

Paving donated time and material to pave E. High Street in time for the Soap Box Derby.

If you haven't been to the Cemetery lately you should go and see what the volunteers and the service department have accomplished this year. #### CAR SAFETY FOR THE WINTER

Ohio's winters are known for their unpredictability," commented Chief Buchert. "I suggest you take the following precautions in order to stay safe on the road:"

- 1. Pay attention to weather reports
- 2. Keep your gas tank at least half full
- 3. When it's icy, avoid parallel parking, since it's easier to get stuck when you have to turn your wheels.
- 4. Don't stop or start suddenly. Pump your brakes gently to stop. If you start to slide, always steer in the same direction that the rear of your auto is going.
- 5. If your door locks freeze, heat your key—don't pour hot water in the lock—it'll just freeze too.

Chief Buchert mentioned that preparing an emergency kit for your car is also a good idea. Include items such as: blankets, extra clothing, dry rations (raisins, nuts, candy), a flashlight with extra batteries, flares, a steel shovel and sand in case you are stuck, and waterproof matches with candles.

The Chief said that the best protection from problems with winter driving is winterizing your car—get a tune up, consider snow tires or chains. Chief Buchert concluded that winter driving does not have to be a hazardous undertaking. A few simple precautions can prevent accidents from happening and keep you prepared just in case they do occur.

The Crestwood 4C's food cupboard recently became the recipient of a very welcome set of shelves. The donation came about from a joint partnership between the Rotary Club of Mantua and the Crestwood Junior/Senior Seminar, "Service Based Learning" class. With the guidance of teacher, Christine Spencer and Principal, Arden Sommers, and the support of Rotary Liaison, Sandy VerDuin, the four student leaders )Kristin Jackson, Janna Head, Mike Skoodopole and Matt Monroe) planned and presented a "Music for Mission" concert at Hiram College's Hayden Hall to raise money to purchase the shelves.

The project raised almost \$1,000. Their enthusiasm continued as they held "Open Mike Nights" at the Mantua Corner's Bar and Grill (formerly The Deck) and at the Hilltop Christian Church to raise additional funds. #### 'NEW SIDEWALK"

Groundbreaking on the new sidewalk, to be installed along Main Street south of the Cuyahoga River, will take place next year. The Village's request for additional grant funds was approved on July 25<sup>th</sup>. That means that 80% of the approximately \$138,000 cost will be paid for by federal grant funds and construction will be performed by the state when they repave St Rt 44. The other 20% and a \$10,000 engineering fee must come from "local" sources. Current donations pledged by the DMRC and property owners at the south end of town amount to over \$28,000.

The original grant was not enough to install storm drains (required by the state) and electrical conduit (for future needs) before sidewalk concrete was poured. Knowing that the Village and DMRC are committed to a quality project, the agency responsible for administrating federal highway funds found it easy to approve the additional grant.

Beyond the storm drains and conduit, a last-minute design change resulted in a slightly higher overall cost than was anticipated when DMRC and property owners

pledged funds to cover the required "local match" - an additional \$5,000 (approximate) is needed.

DMRC's intent in partnering with the Village on this project was to complete it at no cost to the Village. And that is still the goal. If you or someone you know would like to contribute, or if you have any questions or concerns, please contact us at 300-274-4040 or <u>DMRCemail@qmail.com</u>.

Our next Soup Supper will be held <u>Friday</u>, <u>November 01</u>, <u>2013</u> at 6:00 p.m. at the Post Home. The price is \$7.00 per adult and \$3.00 per child under 12. #### **VETERANS' DAY**

In 1918, on the eleventh hour of the eleventh day in the eleventh month, the world rejoiced and celebrated. After four years of bitter war, an armistice was signed. The "war to end all wars" was over.

November 11 was set aside as Armistice Day in the United States, to remember the sacrifices that men and women made during the war in order to ensure a lasting peace.

Congress voted Armistice Day a legal holiday in 1938, twenty years after the war ended. But Americans realized that the previous war would not be the last one. World War II began the following year, and nations great and small again participated in a bloody struggle. After the Second World War, Armistice Day continued to be observed on November 11.

In 1953 townspeople in Emporia, Kansas called the holiday Veterans' Day in gratitude to the veterans in their town. Soon after, Congress passed a bill introduced by a Kansas congressman renaming the national holiday to Veterans' Day. On June 1, 1954, the President signed Public Law 380 which changed Armistice Day to Veterans' Day in honor of the veterans of all wars.

Americans still give thanks for peace on Veterans' Day. There are ceremonies and speeches, and at 11:00 in the morning, most Americans observe a moment of silence, remembering those who fought for peace.

Memorial Day and Veterans' Day are frequently confused. Memorial Day is to honor all those who served and are deceased, so flags fly at half-staff, whereas <u>Veterans' Day</u> is to <u>honor all veterans</u>, <u>deceased and living</u>, therefore <u>flags are flown at full mast</u>.

#### How the Pledge entered the schools.

The Pledge of Allegiance became a daily part of school life in America - accidentally. In 1892, President Benjamin Harrison ordered a National School Celebration Day to mark the 400<sup>th</sup> anniversary of Columbus' voyage to America. Someone called Harrison's attention to the Pledge, which had just been

written. As an afterthought, Harrison said part of the Columbus celebration could be the reciting of the Pledge in schools across the country. Once that special celebration ended, schools continued to have students say the Pledge every morning, and the tradition was born.
